Professor John Fien

Professor John Fien has been at the forefront of the emergence of education for sustainable development. John has been a resource person for UNESCO at the Commission for Sustainable Development and the World Summit on Sustainable Development. He is the creator of the interdisciplinary CD ROM *Teaching and Learning for a Sustainable Future* for UNESCO, and is currently Innovation Professor of Sustainability at RMIT University. His keynote presentation will explore the leadership UNESCO has provided in the global education campaign and provide specific insight into education for sustainable development.



Dr Anugerah Pekerti

Dr Anugerah Pekerti is a former President Director of the Institute for Management Education and Development in Jakarta, and a former chair of the World Vision Indonesia Board. He has been a leading supporter of formal and informal education in Indonesia for many years. Dr Anugerah will be speaking on the role of education in Indonesia's emergence as a country dealing with democracy and a developing economy

Rev. Tim Costello

Rev. Tim Costello is the Chief Executive Officer of World Vision Australia. He has long been a voice for marginalized communities through his Baptist ministry and as former Executive Director of Urban Seed, a Christian not-for-profit outreach service for the urban poor. In 2005 Tim was made an Officer of the Order of Australia for service to the community through contributions to social justice, health and welfare issues, international development assistance and ministry to the Baptist church. Tim will be giving a keynote address on the *Global Campaign for Education*.

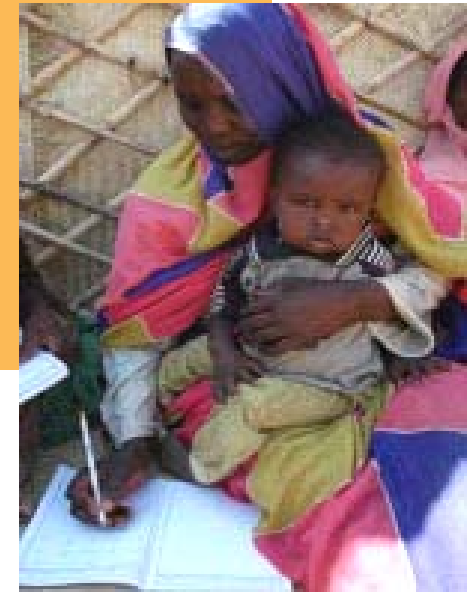
